- 1. Write article analyzing three articles with bias; explain how they're biased.
- 2. Convert biased article into "unbiased" article.
- 3. Write a pure, fact-based, objective article about given topic.
- 4. Write clearly biased article; correct (make objective) in second version.
- 5. Pretty, eye-catching, *cute* poster with biased picture and unbiased picture with explanations of both.
- 6. Report about bias in television news media, determining the political bias of reporter.
- 7. Folk song: Why Can't We All Just Be Objective?
