Dear parents and caregivers:

As you likely know, we have begun our extended study of Shakespeare's *The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet*. As it is usually students' first extended experience with unabridged Shakespeare, there is always a bit of excitement in the class as everyone realizes that, line by line, their comprehension skills have improved: what once seemed impossibly difficult transforms into merely challenging.

As part of the final work for this unit, I like to give students the chance to watch a full production of the play without excessive discussion, without explanation, a chance simply to watch the play as Shakespeare intended. However, I want the final viewing to be memorable and to challenge their newly-formed conceptions of the play. To those ends, I show Baz Luhrmann's *Romeo + Juliet*, a 1996 film version of the play staring Leonardo DiCaprio as Romeo and Claire Danes as Juliet.

Because this film's PG-13 rating, I am required to get parental consent before screening the film. The rating comes from a somewhat sexually-suggestive staging of act three, scene five. For the roughly 40 seconds of inappropriate footage, I simply turn the video off and have the students merely listen to the play's text, essentially removing the scene from the film for students.

Those precautions notwithstanding, I still need a permission slip for each student. If you wish your child not to view this film, I will provide an alternative assignment. As such, please fill out the form at the bottom of this page and have your child return it as soon as possible.
